The Challenge of our Mission Statement

APC will kick off a new Sonship class January 8, 2012. Once again the class will be held on Sunday evenings, from 5-7pm, with nursery provided. The course runs for 16 weeks, and consist of two parts—the first hour each evening is devoted to teaching on the doctrines of adoption and our union in Christ; the second hour centers around small groups, giving us the opportunity to talk through and process with others what we are learning.

The Sonship course is the primary discipleship ministry at APC. We have found it useful in equipping and training APC members in sanctification. Each week, each teaching focuses on the truth that we are sanctified by faith in the finished work of Christ. In other words, we grow as Christians by believing the gospel. The challenge before us is to realize that not only are we justified by grace through faith, but that we are sanctified by grace through faith. Somehow, we have the notion that we are sanctified by what we do. It's quite humbling, but also liberating to learn

that we need Jesus Christ every day for our sanctification just as much as we did for our justification.

During the course we will answer questions such as these: "What is the relationship between the law and gospel?" "What role do my obedience and good works play in my sanctification?" "How do I live with a cleansed conscience?" "How do I learn how to focus more on my heart than just my outward behavior?" "How do I learn how to live as a son or daughter of God, and not like a spiritual orphan?" "What would my life be like if I really believed that God was for me, and that he not only loved me, but truly enjoyed me?"

So whether this is your 1st time to enroll in Sonship, or you feel the need to take it again, we invite you to join us on this spiritual journey. Oh, by the way, many APCers have made new and lasting friendships in their small groups. This is an opportunity to connect in a deeper way with God and others. All you need to do is sign up downstairs at the information table. We will save you a spot.



Christmas Candlelight Service

When Jesus spoke again to the people, he said, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life." (John 8:12)

The festive praise in the sanctuary momentarily subsides as the musicians leave the stage and join the congregation. All the lights are dimmed. The hundreds of us holding our unlit candles wait with anticipation for one of the special traditions in APC's annual Christmas Candlelight Service.

A single flame starts near the front of the sanctuary and then gets passed from wick to wick, ending in a celestial glow that illumines the room. Beautiful decorations delight our eyes again and remind us of the joy and festivity with which we are invited to join the shepherds and angels' procession to the cradle of our Lord. We praise the newborn King with carols like Silent Night: "Radiant beams from Thy holy face, with the dawn of redeeming grace..." From this Child emanated the light that saves humans from the darkness of our sin. The candles are a wonderful reminder of this, for by one small flame the room becomes bathed in

warm, glorious light.

Choir members, Scripture readers, stage crew, and many others have been preparing for weeks to make this a meaningful worship experience for the city of Alexandria. And, of course, there are also opportunities for the congregation to join the choir and professional musicians in singing familiar carols.

Psalm 78: 1-7: "My people, hear my teaching; listen to the words of my mouth. I will open my mouth with a parable; I will utter hidden things, things from of old—things we have heard and known, things our ancestors have told us. We will not hide them from their descendants; we will tell the next generation the praiseworthy deeds of the LORD, his power, and the wonders he has done. He decreed statutes for Jacob and established the law in Israel, which he commanded our ancestors to teach their children, so the next generation would know them, even the children yet to be born, and they in turn would tell their children. Then they would put their trust in God and would not forget his deeds but would keep his commands."

John Calvin's commentaries on Psalm 78 describe this process as "the continued transmission of divine truth." Calvin goes on saying that "fathers should transmit it to their children, as if it were their rightful inheritance, in order that it might never be lost, but be preserved to the end of the world."

We are "gospel-proclaimers" and our audience is the most important in the world, the next generation of God's covenantal sons and daughters. My soul loves a good formula because I see the process laid out before me and I "feel" less likely to mess it up. We are instructed to teach the children and they will place their trust in God, done deal, end of story, right?

So what causes fear to well up in me as a parent? I know my failures as a father and they can cause me to lose hope in my ability to teach/disciple my children. Seeing my children's failures and processing them as a reflection of myself does not help too much either. I too often forget that God is NOT in the business of throwing broken things away (for example—me), rather I know Him as the one who redeems! This brings me hope as I display Jesus to my children in ways that display His glory and power. I can nurture my kids exactly where they are as I receive Christ's love in the same way.

Knowing that God's plan involves me sharing my life in Christ with my children is an awesome responsibility. The command to make disciple-makers from generation to generation is truly a "transmission of divine truth" as Calvin states. Let us teach our children to take hold of their rightful inheritance and look to the Lord in all things, so that they might place their trust in God and not forget His good deeds.
